

John Hinckley Jr. committed high treason when he shot the president of the United States, Ronald Reagan, and his press secretary Mr. James Brady. An act warranting the death penalty and infamy under United States Constitutional law. Instead, he has been coddled and nurtured through "class-privilege" throughout his temporary incarceration. Hinckley was approximately 26 years of age when he committed his high profile domestic terrorist crimes.

In the case of Bruce Allen, he was 19 years of age when he committed his crimes of defending himself from further physical attack by a group of Hard Core Gang members (who were also "liquor intoxicated" at the time of the incident). The individual gang members relevant to the case all had felony criminal records at the time of the incident (July 20, 1981). The denial of truth, equality, justice, and continuing to inflict punishment upon him at this late stage of his life is not an aberration within the California judicial system, it is a willful and calculated act (bump the citizen with irrational sentencing and parole laws, then lift his wallet through continuous tax increases, to pay for mass incarceration). Justice is not a favor. It is a standard, tenet, and indelible mark of equality. It is the antidote to tyranny. The appropriate question is: "Do you have a spirit that knows the difference between right and wrong, that clear contrast between civilized and savagery?" It is debasement of justice to laud the freedom of John Hinckley, but deny the same freedom to Bruce Allen. And thusly, a corrupt foundation is laid, upon which are children will falter. I continue to petition for Commutation of my current sentence (LWOP). Any help that you can contribute toward that state of justice will be appreciated. Thank you.

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Hinckley is freed, for good

Reagan's assailant will live at his mother's Virginia home, with some conditions.

WASHINGTON — John Hinckley Jr., who shot President Reagan in a 1981 assassination attempt, arrived at his mother's Virginia home Saturday after being freed for good from St. Elizabeth's mental hospital.

A federal judge ruled in late July that the 61-year-old Hinckley is not a danger to himself or the public and can live full time at the home in Williamsburg, Va.

Hinckley already had been visiting Williamsburg for long stretches and preparing for the full-time transition. He'll have to follow a lot of rules, but his longtime lawyer, Barry Levine, says he thinks Hinckley will be a "citizen about whom we can all be proud."

This is what life will look like in Williamsburg for Hinckley.

Work

Hinckley will have to work or volunteer at least three days a week. He hasn't yet done paid work in Williamsburg, but he has volunteered at a church and a mental health hospital.

Home Sweet Home

Hinckley will start off living with his elderly mother in her home in the gated community of Kingsmill. Hinckley's room has a king-size bed and TV and is decorated with paintings he

has done of houses and cat according to court documents. In the past, he has done chores like cleaning, dishwashing, laundry and leaf-raking. After a year, he may live alone with roommates.

Therapy

Hinckley will continue to go to therapy. For at least 6 months, he'll see his psychiatrist twice a month and will attend weekly group therapy sessions. He'll also see a therapist individually. He'll return to Washington once a month to see Elizabeth's to discuss his mental health and compliance with the conditions of his release.

Leisure

Hinckley paints and plays the guitar and has been involved in both as part of his therapy. He'll continue to see a music therapist once a month.

There are limits to how Hinckley can spend his leisure time. He can't drink or use illegal drugs. He can't have accounts on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, YouTube or LinkedIn without permission.

Voting

Hinckley can register to vote in Virginia. He has expressed an interest in voting in the past. Levine says he expects his client will register to vote. Virginia's deadline to register for the November election is Oct. 15.

Media

Don't expect to see Hinckley giving any interviews. He's barred from talking to the press.
