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A REPORT ON THE CENTRAL INMATE ACCOUNTS/FUNDS FOR THE PERIOD OF JULY 1, 2016 - JUNE 30, 2017

1. Introduction

The Central Office of the Massachusetts Department of Correction (DOC), pursuant to 103 DOC 476, maintains two separate accounts, the Program Account (476.10) and the Law Library Fund (476.11). These accounts, along with the Central Inmate Benefit Fund (CIB) or Z-1 Account, have been established ostensibly to provide services or benefits to prisoners. The Program Account and the Law Library Fund are funded almost entirely from assessments paid into those accounts by each correctional institution on a monthly basis. The other source of funds comes from interest earned monthly on balances maintained in each account. In the time period covered by this report, the Law Library Fund received 20% of the revenue received into each institution, a reduction from 35% in previous years. [103 DOC 476.11(1)] The Program Account received 10% [103 DOC 476.10(2)]. Each institution is required to submit monthly Inmate Benefit Revenue Reports to the Central Office detailing the institution's total revenue and expenditures for that time period, including the aforementioned assessments.

From July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2017, as in past years, the main source of funds at the institutional level came from commissions received from Keefe Commissary Network (KCN) on purchases made by prisoners at canteens or for clothing and/or appliance items. The commissions are a percentage of the revenue raised by KCN on sales of items to prisoners. KCN commissions alone represent close to 90% of the total revenue received by institutions. Other sources of income for institutions include commissions on sales of products in vending machines, interest, soda bottle refunds, and locker money collected from visitors. Commissions paid on sales of music, MP3/MP4 players and accessories, and Secure Pak sales go directly into the CIB and are not received at the institutional level.

The DOC established the Program Account as "an effort to identify and utilize all available resources ... to supplement existing programs or funding for new programs throughout the Department." [103 DOC 476.10(11)] The DOC does not indicate in 103 DOC 476 the reason why the Law Library Fund was established or how the funds are to be expended. In past years, the Law Library Fund was used to computerize the law libraries in each institution. That work has been completed for some time. What remains is merely to upload the information provided by the courts and vendors on a semi regular basis and to pay for network connections and maintenance.

The CIB (Z-1) is not referenced in 103 DOC 476. Z-1 Accounts are maintained in each institution and are funded by the revenue left over after the Law Library Fund and Program Account assessments have been paid to the Central Office. The CIB appears to be an

extension of the individual Z-1 institutional accounts. The DOC does not assess institutional revenue to support the CIB Fund. In past years, funds have been transferred from the Central Law Library Fund to the CIB when funds were needed in that account.

Superintendents from each institution can petition the Central Office for payment of major institutional expenditures from one of the three central accounts on a case-by-case basis. Any expenditure exceeding \$1,000 from institutional Z-1 accounts, however, must be given written approval from Administrative Services in the Central Office. [103 DOC 476.12(5)] Superintendents are responsible for expending the 70% remaining at the institutional level after the Central Office assessments have been paid. According to 103 DOC 476.12(2): "Expenditures of such funds [at the institutional level] shall benefit the general inmate population or be for any goods or services determined by the Commissioner to be necessary to maintain and/or enhance the delivery of services to inmates."

2. Total Sources and Uses of Funds - Fiscal Year 2017

The total of the Sources of Funds exceeded the total Uses of Funds by \$225,547.59. This overage was \$152,781.03 less than Fiscal Year 2016's overage of \$378,328.62 or a decrease of 40.4%. This difference can be accounted for primarily due to the decrease to 20% in the monthly assessments for the Law Library Fund. The decrease in the Sources of Funds for the Law Library Fund from Fiscal 2016 to Fiscal 2017 was: \$266,402.09 or 40.7%.

² The total of the Sources of Funds decreased from \$119,491.57 in Fiscal 2016 to \$81,320.19 in Fiscal 2017 primarily due to a one-time transfer in Fiscal 2016 of \$39,818.34 from the Bay State Inmate Benefit Fund upon the closing of that institution.

³ In addition to the NEADS expenditures from the CIB, the MCI-Norfolk Z-1 Account also expended \$3,444.81 for the NEADS Program at that institution, for a total of \$7,756.54 between the two funds. This does not include any funds expended at other institutions where the NEADS Program functions.

- ¹ The decrease of \$266,402.09 from FY 2016 or 40.7% was primarily due to the decrease in monthly assessment percentage from 35% to 20% charged to each institution.
- ² Despite the 40.7% decrease in revenue, the ending balance increased by \$172,587.98 or 12.3%. Given that increased surplus, the assessment percentage of 20% again needs to be reviewed. In fact, in FY2017, the assessment percentage could have been reduced to 12% and the expenses would have been covered.
- ³ This averages \$968.36 per month. Given that interest rates hover around 1%, this interest amount reflects the balance, at or over \$1,000,000, maintained in this fund. Why such an amount is left to merely collect interest at a very low rate needs to be investigated.
- ⁴ Annual subscriptions for Lawyers' Weekly and Lawyers' Diary are ordered separately for each institution and billed separately in different months. It would seem more efficient to order in bulk for the sixteen institutions, pay invoices once, and seek quantity discounts.

¹ The Central Program Account operates on a slightly different Fiscal Year calendar in 2017 from the other two central accounts. For the purposes of this report, based on the data reported pursuant to the Public Records request, the FY 2017 for the Program Account ended on July 17, 2017.

² The primary source of income for this account is the monthly 10% Assessment to each institution against its monthly revenues. The DOC does not break down how much each institution contributed or the amount of interest earned.

³ No specific institutions were noted for this expenditure.

The total of the Ending Balances on June 30, 2016 was \$2,356,549.32. (See A Report On The Sources And Uses Of Funds From The Massachusetts Department of Correction's Central Inmate Benefit Fund, Central Law Library Fund And Central Program Account, October 2016, published by the Lifers' Group Inc. at 8.) The total of the Ending Balances on June 30, 2017 was \$2,582,096.91, an increase of \$225,547.59 or 9.6%. The perennial question remains, which has gone unanswered year after year: Why is the Department of Correction simply stockpiling funds in these accounts rather than increasing spending for programs designed to reduce recidivism?
